ANNUAL REPORT 1975

1975 was the Golden Jubilee Year for our Movement and Essex took an active part in the Celebrations. In the Jubilee Pageant through the City of London, Essex was ably represented by the Hornchurch Drum & Trumpet Corps and the Lifstan Boys' Club, and at the activities weekend at Crystal Palace by the Basildon and Frenford Boys' Clubs. As Chairman of Essex I was invited to serve on the Panel which selected the best float in the Pageant, and was also a member of the Committee responsible for the Jubilee Service held in the King's College Chapel.

In my 1974 message I said our objective for 1975 was to help Clubs by arranging Training Courses and to assist with Leadership problems. It has not been easy to achieve these objectives but our Organising Secretary has been of considerable help to Clubs with personnel problems and had arranged a training weekend for junior members, which had to be postponed to a later date as the venue was found to be unsuitable. The Meeting of Chairman and Leaders held at the Fryerns' Boys' Club was a very helpful and encouraging evening. Such 'get-togethers' are very valuable not only to the Association but also to those who attend, for by discussing and sharing problems much can be learned. Essex is very proud of its record of being one of the very few Counties whose affiliated Clubs with but one exception are run entirely voluntarily.

The participation of our Clubs in CLUB WEEK was most encouraging and I would congratulate everyone on their splendid efforts. It is surprising how much money can be raised by taking advantage of National CLUB WEEK to appeal to local residents and to show them exactly what is done; one Club raised £2,600 mainly through a highly organised House-to-House collection. Not only do individual Clubs benefit but also the Essex Association and National Association without whose support and know-how we would not be nearly so successful—national events, training courses, adventure projects, international activities, and advice and help on many other varied subjects.

During the year I have had an opportunity of visiting a number of Essex Clubs, and sporting events, and I am much encouraged by the work which is being done to meet the need of boys in the County. Despite those 'Jonahs' who say the day of the Boys' Club is finished, I am delighted to record that over the Country, and in Essex particularly, Clubs for boys are increasing. We do not hide our heads in the sand and think that the opposite sex does not exist; how can we with the Sex Equality Act so recently passed by Parliament? Most of our Clubs provide opportunities for their members to mix with the fair sex in a social atmosphere, and in some cases have a 'twin' girls Club associated with them. There are, however, occasions when boys, and men for that matter, need to be on their own, and certain activities demand this, so Boys' Clubs continue to meet such a need and will ever continue to do so.

We return time and time again to the mundane matter of finance and I make no apology for doing so again. I cannot emphasise too strongly the importance of the financial income of the Association, which is dependent to a great extent on the support of Clubs, through affiliation fees, Club Week, sporting events organised by the Association and the organising of appeals and money raising functions. The better our financial position the better service we can provide to Clubs. We had hoped that an improved financial position would have enabled us to appoint a part-time Assistant to our Organising Secretary, who has an enormous amount of work to undertake—with many 'unsocial' hours—being responsible for the day to day running of the Association, organising numerous activities, Club visiting and attending Club and N.A.B.C. Committees, and to some extent raising money for the Association. I cannot pay a high enough tribute to the work which Peter Warner does and this, I know, will be supported and endorsed by affiliated Clubs. With the present financial restriction we cannot anticipate further assistance from official sources, so it behoves us all to ensure we do our utmost to support the Association in every way possible, and

encourage our friends to help Clubs in a practical and generous manner.

Finally may I pay a very warm tribute to all the Leaders, Helpers and Members of Management Committee who give so much of their time and energy in our Clubs. During the year, our Honorary Treasurer, Mr. J. G. D. Phillips was forced to resign on health grounds, and to him we owe a real debt as over 3 years he guided our finances and was of immense support. We wish him a return to good health and thank him sincerely for all he has done for the Association. To date we have not been able to find a replacement, nor have we been able to set up an Appeals Committee—both matters are receiving our urgent attention.

Without the support of a very active and devoted Executive Committee the Association would not be in the strong position it is today, and I would express my sincere thanks to them all. As reported at the last A.G.M., Dr. F. P. A. Garton who had been associated with the Association for 20 years had to resign, and his place as Vice-Chairman has been taken

by Mr. H. A. Eccles whom we welcome most cordially.

The inspiration of our President, Col. Sir John Ruggles-Brise, Bt., is incalculable he continues to give us tremendous support and through his active interest we have strengthened our Executive Committee. We are most appreciative.

I look forward with confidence to the future success, growth and

prosperity of the Essex Association of Boys' Clubs.

The Reception for Chairmen of Clubs, Club Leaders and Helpers held at the Fryerns Boys' Club in October proved to be the most successful to date, with over 60 present. Their Ladies Committee provided excellent refreshment, and a conducted tour of these premises was undertaken with the Chairman of the Club, Mr. M. W. Payne as Guide. The Chairman—Mr. Jack Carter—and the Secretary spoke on matters relevant to both the Association and Clubs, and particularly referred to Club Week, which was formally 'launched'.

A presentation was made during the evening to Mr. Tony Read (Berry Boys' Club) in recognition of his 25 years service with the Club.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING AND ANNUAL DINNER

The format of the A.G.M. and Annual Dinner was similar to previous years, and a large number of Club Members supported friends of the Association when our President, Col. Sir John Ruggles-Brise, Bt.,

presided at the County Hotel, Chelmsford in April last.

Dr. F. P. A. Garton, MB, BSc., DIH., formerly Vice-Chairman, who had followed his Father Mr. J. W. Garton on the Executive Committee, was elected a Vice-President in recognition of his most valuable services over many years. Later in the evening, the President presented the Club Week Trophies and to Roger Race (Lifstan Boys' Club) his National Boys' Club membership badge. Mr. Brian Taylor, a former member of the Fairbairn House B.C., London, and latterly Captain of Essex C.C.C. and an England Selector, gave an interesting

and amusing talk on his Club and cricketing reminiscences and spoke particularly to those senior boys present on team spirit, and the many advantages of their Club membership. Mr. Vic Betts (NABC) outlined the arrangements for the N.A.B.C. Golden Jubilee that was being celebrated later in 1975.

CLUBS AND MEMBERSHIP

Statistically in 1975 the number of Clubs and membership was down on recent years. In fact no clubs resigned during the year and the adjustment took place at the commencement of the year, when the Annual Returns were due. It is encouraging that at the time of going to Press three Clubs have sought affiliation, and since the N.A.B.C. have new conditions of membership, it is anticipated that, while maintaining "standards", more Clubs will affiliate.

N.A.B.C. GOLDEN JUBILEE

50 years to the day—24th October, the Rt. Hon. The Viscount Amory, KG, PC, GCM, TD, President of the London Federation of Boys' Clubs gave the 12th Basil Henriques Memorial Lecture to a fully representative and appreciative audience of Club Members and their friends thus acknowledging the formation of the National Association of Boys' Clubs. Earlier in the year, the Chairman, Mr. C. Jack Carter had been privileged to attend, in company with many other N.A.B.C. and County personnel, a Royal Garden Party, and in many other ways, the Association was involved in a number of events to mark the occasion.

Last minute difficulties arose over the float for the Pageant through the City of London, but Lifstan manfully 'improvised' in a Mini-bus; and the Hornchurch Drum and Trumpet Corps won the best Band award—it is recalled that they knew the route as a few years ago they had taken part in the Lord Mayor's Show! Later during that weekend, members of Basildon Boys' Club (runners-up in the NABC Tug-of-war Championships—and members of their wrestling demonstration team) and Frenford Boys' Club (singles and doubles winners in the N.A.B.C. Senior table tennis Championships) were presented to TRH The Duke and Duchess of Gloucester, who graced the proceedings at the National Sports Centre, Crystal Palace, by their presence.

CLUB WEEK

A slight increase in the number of Clubs participating in Club Week was encouraging although until every Club in the Association recognises the full significance of Club Week—fund raising, publicity and recruitment, besides the over-all benefits derived from a corporate effort and thus contributing whole-heartedly to the National effort, it cannot be truly said that our contribution with only 13 Clubs out of 25 taking part, is as great as it should be. The co-operation of Clubs in seeing that all Returns were submitted by the end of the year was appreciated. There is evidence to suggest that those Clubs which plan their run-up to Club Week well in advance of the actual date, benefit greatly, and by making a concerted effort towards the climax of the Club Week period find that more can be involved and that the various projects they have in hand do not disrupt the Club programme.

The 'military' operation backed up by good administration helped Hornchurch Drum and Trumpet Corps to achieve another phenomenal success from their House to House collection—£2,600 so once again winning the Courtauld Shield (for the 5th consecutive year!) The encouragement given to Clubs with small but no less enthusiastic aspirations, by the award of the County Cup, saw a new name—Berry Boys' Club—on the trophy. Congratulations to them both.

With no formal ceremony in London with the presentation of greetings, owing to the Golden Jubilee celebrations of the N.A.B.C. earlier in the year, the Chairman of the Association wrote encouraging all Clubs to enter, and wishing them well in their forthcoming efforts.

As will be seen from the Honours Board, elsewhere in this Report, the Association has organised a wide programme of events and has participated in a number of N.A.B.C. activities. For the first time for many years, a football meeting was held and a trial staged to form an E.A.B.C. squad. In certain events members have done well in National events, and besides congratulating them on their achievements, we record with considerable satisfaction the way in which Individuals and Teams have conducted themselves both on and off the field of play. This basic training of sportsmanship is after all the essence of such competitions, and all credit is due to the members and their Clubs.

Besides the participation of Clubs in E.A.B.C. events, we do know that local activities are well supported, and we hear of numerous successes in many fields of sport.

We pay tribute to two Clubs—specialised insofar as originally they were one "activity", who have now widened their interests; the Canvey Island Boys' and A.B.C. who during the year had five members and the daughter of the Leader proficient enough to win the Duke of Edinburgh Award Bronze certificate through their canoeing, and the Thurrock Harriers who had exhibits in the Arts Festival.

To the many helpers who give so much of their time and skills in the coaching and training as well as the Officials of Governing Bodies who assist us in officiating at our events, we extend our warm thanks. It would not be out of place to mention specially in this last category, Charles Maslin (Basildon) and Pat Dawkins (Lifstan) the joint Managers of the E.A.B.C. football team; Peter Orpin (Thurrock Harriers) for his great assistance with the Cross Country and Athletics. Without them all we would find it difficult to maintain the standard that is so essential.
