



CHAIRMANS REPORT-Jonathan Douglas-Hughes OBE DL

2017 was a satisfactory year for EBGC and its clubs. The programme of activities was well supported especially events such as the Adventure Weekend at Stubbers, which saw over 200 young people from Essex clubs taking part with an additional 100 participants from the National Association of Boys and Girls Clubs network from all over the country joining us.

Our support for clubs continues to be the top priority for us and we are very pleased to say that we received funding through the Big Lottery Youth Investment Fund to establish new inclusive youth clubs focused on young people with additional needs in the old Essex Boroughs of Barking and Dagenham, Redbridge and Havering. This is a three year programme that we are running in partnership with two of our existing clubs Ab Phab and Frenford Clubs.

We delivered over 800 NCS places in the summer using the Birmingham Clubs for Young People outdoor site in Earlswood, Cherry Tree Army Centre in Colchester and the Olympic Park Hadleigh. The staff worked extremely hard to ensure that all the young people had a tremendous experience which they did. Due to a most unsatisfactory handling of the programme by the intermediate provider, we will not be running the programme in 2018, which will be the first time we have not delivered places on this government backed programme since we ran the first pilot event in Essex some 8 or so years ago.

We continue to provide training needed by club leaders to run their programmes specifically Child Protection, First Aid, and Level 1 and 2 youth work courses but we are happy to organise any course that a club may need to successfully provide their

Our Outdoor centres continue to be well used by clubs and other youth groups. Maes Y Lade once again posted a profit at the year end. Since we acquired the centre from Essex County Council, three years ago we have transformed the centre into a highly successful operation. This is a testament to the hard work of David Hassard, the centre manager and his team. Brian Thompson from Maryport Boys and Girls Clubs in Cumbria continues to ensure that the High Row Centre is in tip top condition to welcome groups. Brian does this totally voluntarily and is a

tremendous supporter of young people from all areas. Of course we have Stubbers Adventure Centre, which is as busy and as popular as ever. If your club would like to use any of the centres then make contact with the EBGC office and our staff will make your trip a reality, together with financial support.

Thank you to everyone that has supported our Association in whatever way, whether that is with your time or financially. Without both we would not be able to do what we do and the young people of Essex would be much the poorer.

DIRECTORS REPORT-Martin Solder

What an interesting and productive year 2017 has been. We have had some great successes. Our Youth Investment Fund grant means our association will be able to support and set up groups with additional needs. Whilst we have always had a number of clubs that have worked with young people with additional needs we have never specifically embarked on developing new clubs for them. The next few years will be interesting and rewarding and I am sure that our strength of providing purposeful activities will be successful.

If you have never visited Maes Y Lade or High Row then you really need to. We can make this happen for your club and your young people. They are two wonderful residential centres based in remote parts of Cumbria and South Wales both nestled at the foot of mountains with unparalleled views. The activities we can provide are varied and exciting. If you cannot get a club group together then why not join in one of our get into programmes that encompass caving, climbing and canoeing. Individuals can sign up as well as larger club groups. Alongside these centres we have Stubbers Adventure Centre, which we have now run for the last 25 years. We have the Adventure weekend and the usual Wet and Dry activity days that clubs can sign up to. Stubbers goes from strength to strength.

You will have read in our Chairman's report and throughout this review about the successes, events and opportunities that we have given to young people over the last year. We have been doing this for nearly 80 years for young people all over Essex. I was lucky enough to represent Frenford in the 1974 under 14's table tennis Championships winning both the singles and the doubles and one of the medals has a footballer on it, I have never been sure why! I still have the medals in a drawer at home and for a young lad who lived in Newham who had limited opportunities in life I think it spurred me on to bigger and better things.

Two years later I went to America with the London Federation of Boys Clubs and spoke at the 1976 Essex Boys Club AGM at the County Hotel, which was probably the scariest thing that I ever had to do in my life and it was not until years later that I understood the enormity of the experience of meeting senator John Glen (former astronaut) at the Pentagon and Walter Mondale vice president elect of America in the Capital Building along with a host of other incredibly important people at fantastic venues all over Washington. We even stayed opposite the Watergate building for a couple of days. Why mention this in the annual report, well today we aim to do exactly the same as we did in 1974. We provide similar character building and life changing experiences for young people. Young people still speak at AGM's. We still go to foreign countries and we still run table tennis championships along with hundreds of other events, activities and opportunities. You just need to sign up to something and take part. You never know when you start where it might lead.

Was I unusual and a one off? Well one of the other participants on the America trip in 1976 is now the Chairman of Chelmsford Boys Club and an EBGC Trustee and the young person who won the U12's Table Tennis Championships in 1974 went on to become an ETTA National Senior Champion and a full international and in later life became a millionaire football agent. The U16's Champion also became a millionaire through his own printing business. So was I unusual.......? The opportunities are there for all our young people to be successful. You just need to get involved

I thank everyone for all their support over the 28 years that I have been at EBGC especially those that have supported our work during 2017. We are all looking forward to 2018 and relishing the challenge that it will bring and looking to provide an even bigger and better range of activities and support for clubs and their young people.

TREASURER'S REPORT - Graham Middleton

As with most if not all Charity's relying on donations as their principle source of income, fortunes will wax and wane over time. Projects, no matter how successful they may have been, run their course and make room for other opportunities to become the focus of tomorrow's objectives. Those Charities that have carefully husbanded their resources will have invested their cash carefully, protecting themselves against the challenges of potentially less lucrative times and arming themselves to take full advantage of future initiatives to expand their charitable activities.

So it is for us. We have substantially withdrawn from delivering the National Citizens Service and as a consequence seen our income fall some 14% overall in 2017. We also saved the delivery costs of this project and a considerable amount of management time, the full benefit of which will become evident in 2018 and beyond as we reinvest the experiences gained into future opportunities to engage with young people.

Over the past few years, NCS proved to be very good for us. The outcomes for the young participants were generally excellent and we were efficient in our delivery. The surpluses over the years have enabled us to buy the freeholds of our two outdoor centres at Maes-y-Lade and High Row providing an excellent resource and permanent legacy for the future. Both Centres are operating successfully.

There is no doubt that our fortunes will diminish over the next few years as we work to replace the NCS project and we have been careful to set aside sensible cash sums so that we can keep our core activities expanding, we have some exciting opportunities emerging. We have earmarked £120,000 to fund the new innovations we are developing and for which, once established, we hope to base future fund raising activity. We have also maintained a £100,000 bursary fund to help our member clubs make use of our outdoor centres and £50,000 to fund overseas exchanges. We have also secured new funding for future Respect projects and plan to further develop our support activities for our members.

What will be stretched in this process is our core fund and again, while we are able to do so we have ring-fenced funds to ensure we can maintain the staff resource to protect this from the impact of any income reduction. We have also made sure that all potential liabilities arising from renegotiating Stubbers lease with the London Borough of Havering are covered.

Going back to last year, our core fund sustained a deficit of £260,059, this was effectively covered by surpluses on our Designated Fund activities of £213,036 and Restricted Fund activities of £322,393 netting out to an overall surplus of £275,369, similar to 2016. This means of course that the work we do aimed at training educating and generally developing young people continues to expand and gives us a great deal to do in chasing our charitable ideals over the next couple of years, but our core activities also need this continual expansion and we are refocussing our fundraising to ensure this happens also.

With Restricted Funds of £685,518; Designated Funds of £1,217,657; and Core funds of £760,385, most of which is invested in outdoor centres, we are very well positioned to deliver a purposeful and exciting future for the youth of Essex and beyond.

CLUB NEWS

Established in 1939 as part of the Boys' Club Movement, we were deeply involved with the development of grassroots sports programmes, 78 years later we continue to stay close to where we started but now support 120 affiliated youth clubs across Essex and East London. We offer a large activity programme, training, opportunities and support for both young people, volunteers and committees to enable both new and existing youth provision to develop. Young people are at the heart of what we do and we are always looking at new and exciting opportunities for our clubs and young people to take part in.

YOUTH INVESTMENT FUND

In 2017 we were awarded a £600,000 grant from the Youth Investment Fund to provide Redbridge, Barking and Dagenham and Havering with a new inclusive youth club in each area. These clubs have been set up for young people aged 10-25 yrs, with an inclusive youth work curriculum in place including sport and activities – to cater for young people with and without disabilities.

We are working in partnership with affiliated clubs Ab Phab and Frenford Clubs, local councils, schools, colleges and young people to ensure the clubs are set up to benefit the communities around them.

In 2015 funding was secured by local residents who consulted with their communities to bid for the £1m on Canvey Island. EBGC's role is to act as the Local Trusted Organisation, also employing a member of staff to oversee the project- Gerry Smith.

Gerry has worked hard alongside the committee to continue to raise the aspirations and skills of the residents by working with other organisations locally including Essex Youth Service and Yellow Door to bring opportunities such as the mobile youth bus on a regular basis to First Avenue to engage with the local Young People. Other successes so far have been a swimming project with a large and successful volunteer swimming club based at the Waterside Farm pool and also the creation of a new play area at the 'Lake' along with Canvey Town Council.

A MESSAGE FROM MAES Y LADE

Maes y lade, the EBGC centre nestled at the foot of the Black Mountains in South Wales has continued to grow in 2017 with an increase in numbers of young people staying at the centre and development of the site with 63 beds now available for visiting groups as well as additional space for camping. This has all been possible thanks to the support of EBGC member clubs, schools and voluntary groups in Essex and East London. The number of young people that we welcomed to the centre was over 600 more than in 2015 with 1,600 young people taking part in residential outdoor experiences with us this year! It is great to welcome EBGC clubs on specific club trips as well as hosting multi club events such as Easter Cup, the Representative Football Squad tour and 100 mile canoe test training along with Volunteer and Young Leader Training as well.

Against the spectacular back drop of the Brecon Beacons National Park our focus remains to create opportunities for real adventure, getting into the outdoors to conquer mountains, paddle rivers, explore caves, mountain bike trails, climb on real rock and scramble through gorges and waterfalls. We are looking forward to seeing even more club members and leaders in 2018!

Maes y Lade is one of three EBGC outdoor centres and complement the High Row Centre in the Lake District and the Stubbers Adventure Centre in Upminster, London Borough of Havering.

EXCITING NEW VENTURES LAYER MARNEY OUTDOORS

Set in the grounds of Layer Marney Tower near Colchester, the centre is open to all of our affiliated clubs and their members (9yrs+) at subsidised prices. You will have access to a wide range of activities including kayaking, raft building, laser tag and rifle shooting, plus many more!
